**Susan Stanford Friedman** is Virginia Woolf Professor of English and Women's Studies, and Sally Mead Hands Bascom Professor of English at the University of Wisconsin, Madison. Her distinguished work on transnational modernisms and the literature migration and diaspora puts her in the forefront of critics working on literature and culture in a comparative, transnational, and global context. This is the inaugural lecture in a year-long series on the new transnational turn in literary and cultural studies. It will feature work from interdisciplinary and transnational fields including English, American Studies, Feminist and Gender Studies, Africana and Diaspora Studies, Latino/a Studies, and Postcolonial Studies. It is designed to explore with a broad range of Loyola faculty and students the explosion of new work being done in the humanities that presses beyond traditional nation-state boundaries to study literary and cultural production in a transnational framework. **This event is co-sponsored by the Modern Languages and Literatures Department, the Asian, Latin American, and Black World Studies Programs, and by the Gannon Center and the Women's Studies and Gender Studies Program.**
