## CUTTING-EDGE FACILITIES

Loyola law facilities are designed to sustain a sense of community and collaboration for our nearly 1,000 students. The Philip H. Corboy Law Center is located at 25 E. Pearson St. in the heart of Chicago's vibrant Gold Coast, just off Michigan Avenue. A current renovation of School of Law facilities has created a technologically advanced ceremonial courtroom and will add modern classrooms and new clinical and student gathering space.

## DIVERSE AND DYNAMIC STUDENT BODY

Students at Loyola School of Law represent a multitude of cultures, backgrounds, and interests, a diversity that is continually nurtured by the University's renowned Jesuit tradition. The entering class size, including full and part-time students, is approximately 290. Our average class size is 20 students; only 7 percent of our classes have more than 50 students, and a third have fewer than 15 students.

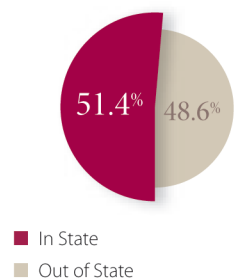

## ACCLAIMED AND ACCESSIBLE FACULTY

Loyola faculty members have authored countless books and articles used in classrooms across the country. They are experts in a variety of specific areas of the law, and frequently serve as sources for media inquiry or comment. ## STATE-OF-THE-ART LAW LIBRARY

The law library, a place to study, conduct research, and collaborate with classmates, houses publications from all branches of government and expert explanations of the law in both print and electronic forms. Tables, carrels, group study rooms, and informal seating provide a variety of spaces for student use. The library's resources, including more than 400,000 volumes, enhance Loyola's broad-based law curriculum and support the research interests of students and faculty. Reference librarians provide research assistance, teach basic and advanced legal research classes, and offer specialized research training.

## ACTIVE AND ENGAGED ALUMNI

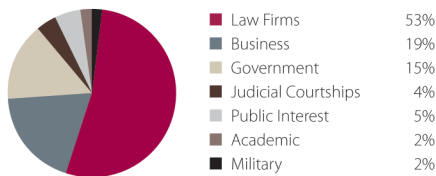

## CAREER SERVICES

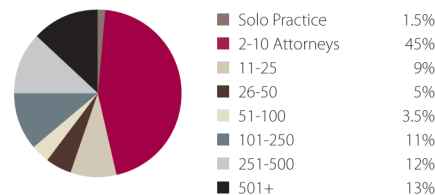
