CAS/SOC Proficiency Exam This exam tests for proficiency at the level typically attained by completing 102.	This is one option for students who need to fulfill the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) or School of Communication (SOC) foreign language graduation requirement. The proficiency exam is coordinated by CAS and SOC. Not all students must take this exam. To meet the foreign language requirement, one of the following is necessary: -Score a 3 or higher on a high school advanced placement foreign language test. -Take one foreign language course at the 102 level or higher and complete it with a C- or above. -Pass the CAS/SOC proficiency exam.
