Philosophical Knowledge	Philosophy
Six credit hours—Understand influential philosophic questions, methods of inquiry; formulate and defend solutions to philosophic and ethical issues	PHL 110 (See <i>Ethics</i> below. If students take one ethics course and one philosophy course, they meet both areas.)
Ethics: Three credit hours —Demonstrate the ability to do ethical reflection and decision-making	PHL 113, 114, 115 (Students can take two ethics courses and complete both Ethics and Philosophical Knowledge.)
