**Biographical History**

Helena Beatrice Znaniecka Lopata was born in Poznan, Poland on October 1, 1925 to Florian Znaniecki and Eileen Markley. Helena's father was an internationally recognized Polish sociologist; her mother was an American lawyer with a Ph.D. in Law from the University of Chicago. For the first fourteen years of her life, Helena lived with her parents in Poznan, frequently traveling to the United States. When the Nazis entered Poland in September 1939, Helena and her Mother, as members of the intelligentsia, were imprisoned in a concentration camp for later deportation to an extermination camp. Helena's father was in America at that time serving as a visiting professor at Columbia University. Determined to save her daughter and herself, Helena's mother lied to the camp commander claiming to be an American citizen (she had lost her American citizenship when she married Znaniecki and moved to Poland) with important political connections and demanding release for herself and her "orphaned niece (Helena)." The lie proved effective. Helena and her mother were released from the camp and left for the USA soon afterward.

After arriving in the USA, Helena enrolled in Champaign Urbana High School, from which she graduated in 1942 after becoming a member of the National Honor Society. Four years later, she received B.A. in Sociology (with honors) from the University of Illinois and, a year later, an M.A. in Sociology also from the University of Illinois. In 1949 Helena began a Ph.D. program at the University of Chicago. Expected to follow her father's area of interest, it was suggested that she continue her father's work in her dissertation. She reluctantly agreed and wrote her dissertation on "The Function of Voluntary Association in an Ethnic Community: Polonia" (a topic that would later

become one of her major research interests). Helena received her Ph.D. in Sociology (with honors) in 1954.

In 1946, while still an undergraduate student, Helena met Richard Lopata, a second-generation Polish-American, fresh out of the Marine Corps. They married the same year. After earning her Ph.D., Helena immersed herself for almost 12 years in family life, caring for her home and raising their two children, Teodora, born in 1951, and Stefan, born in 1955. During these years when her main “occupation” was taking care of her family, she taught evening classes part-time in Chicago at DePaul University (from 1956 until 1960) and at Roosevelt University (from 1964 until 1969). Also at that time she began to research suburban housewives—the role that she herself was experiencing. Reflecting on that project Dr. Lopata wrote, “No one wanted to read about housewife. Just as my male friends from the University of Chicago, that I saw at meetings, have never recognized that I was doing sociology in which basic ‘sensitizing’ concepts were applied to studies of women” (*Life as Sociologist*, 92). Her study of housewives was expanded, with the help of a grant from *The Chicago Tribune*, and resulted in a book, *Occupation: Housewife* (1971).

Dr. Lopata became fully active in research in 1966, when she returned from her first trip to Poland. In her memoirs she writes that during that trip she realized that she “had deserted the obligation of the intelligentsia to contribute to world culture” (*Ibid*, 91). This realization triggered Helena’s transition from being an American housewife to being a sociologist with both national and international involvement. After her return from Poland, Dr. Lopata expanded her study of widows (launched in 1964) to a worldwide scale, attempting to include such countries as Poland, Yugoslavia, Finland, Egypt, Iraq, Israel, Turkey, Korea and Australia. The results of her extensive research were numerous articles two books written by her—*Widowhood in an American City* (1973) and *Women as Widows: Support System* (1979) as well as edited by her a two-volume work, *Widows: The Middle East, Asia and the Pacific* (1987) and *Widows: North America* (1987). The latter work addresses widowhood in a variety of countries.

In 1969 Dr. Lopata joined the faculty of the Sociology Department of Loyola University Chicago, where in 1972 she established the Center for Comparative Study of Social Roles. In this Center, Dr. Lopata, supported by a team of researchers (while still immersed in the widowhood study), begins a large survey of city women and their occupational and family involvement. This study resulted in a two-volume work, *City Women: Work, Jobs, Occupations, Careers: America* (Lopata, Barnewolt, & Miller, 1984, 1985). In the meantime, she returned to the subject of her dissertation conducting a study of Polish Americans Community in Chicago. This study resulted in the book, *Polish Americans: Status Competition in the Ethnic Group*. Dr. Lopata published her books under the names Helena Znaniecki Lopata, as well as Helena Znaniecka Lopata; the latter version—Znaniecka (with the ending ‘a’) indicates female in Polish. In 1997, Dr. Lopata retired. She died on February 12, 2003.

In the course of time, Lopata’s works became increasingly feminist in orientation, addressing such issues as the meaning of the terms “sex roles” and “gender,” and focusing on the constrain of women by a strong gender stratification system. Her study allowed her to argue that there is not a sex-gender or class role, but rather relations of power and inequality masked by language.

Moreover, she argued that this false perception of the role of sex and gender constitutes a framework for social policy that causes women to be in a dependent status position.

### **Scope and Content**

The Helena Znaniecka-Lopata papers span the period 1962 to 1995 and consist of 14 archival boxes. There are five series in this collection: Biographical, Research Projects, Publication, Associations and Conferences, Tenure at Loyola University Chicago.

**Series 1: Biographical Information, 1975-1990, n.d., Box 1**, opens with Helena Znaniecka-Lopata's Curriculum Vitae and includes "Biographical Sketch of Helena Lopata by Mary Jo Deegan, biographical Sketch by B. Ryan, "Integrative Feminist and Sociological Thought: the Life and Thought of Helena Lopata," other documents.

**Series 2: Research, 1962-1990, n.d., Boxes 1-6**, is organized chronologically and consists of material pertaining to research conducted by Dr. Znaniecka-Lopata. This series includes applications for grants, grant proposals, grant accounting, subcontracts with Survey Research Laboratory, correspondence, and other documents. Topics of research and proposed research include the role of the housewife, widowhood, women and work, and American women. Because at times Dr. Znaniecka-Lopata conducted research projects simultaneously, for the sake of clarity the research project(s) to which each folder pertains is indicated in bold letters in the container list.

**Series 3: Publications, 1965-1995, n.d., Boxes 7-8**, is organized chronologically and consists of articles and papers published by Dr. Znaniecka-Lopata, as well as Manuscript of Support System Involving Widows in a Metropolitan Area of the United States, and Occupation Housewife.

**Series 4: Professional Associations and Conferences, 1963-1990, n.d., Boxes 9-13**, is arranged accordingly to subjects, and organized chronologically within each subject. Series 4 consists of documents pertaining to Dr. Lopata's involvement in Midwest Sociological Society, American Sociological Association, Sociologists for Women in Society, and other organizations as well as series of cassettes addressing the issues of death, grief and bereavement.

**Series 5: Tenure at Loyola University-Chicago, 1970-1966, n.d. Box 14**, is arranged accordingly to subjects, documents in each folder are arranged chronologically. This series by and large consists of correspondence with Loyola University's faculty and administration.
