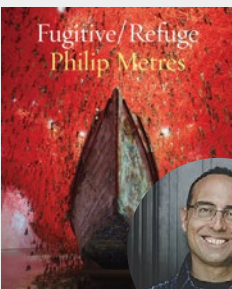
PETER MAURIN CONFERENCE

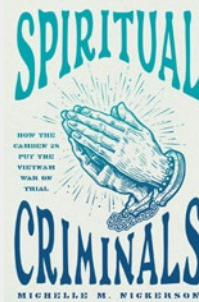

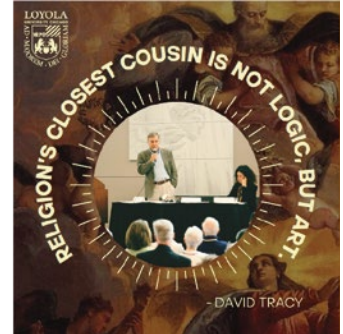
