Professor Alexander Beecroft is a distinguished scholar of comparative literature and literary theory, specializing in the literatures of Ancient Greece and Rome, the literatures of pre-Tang China, literary theory (ancient and modern), and current debates about world literature. He is author of *Authorship and Cultural Identity in Early Greece and China: Patterns of Literary Circulation* (Cambridge University Press, 2010), an *Ecology of World Literature: From Antiquity to the Present Day* (Verso, 2015), and many articles and essays. His scholarship has been recognized by a Charles A. Ryskamp Research Fellowship from the American Council of Learned Societies and by numerous invitations to lecture at universities in North America, Europe, China, and India. His current book project, under contract with Johns Hopkins University Press, is *A Global History of Literature*.

This annual endowed lecture honors the memory and scholarship of Edward L. Surtz, S.J., a beloved member of the Loyola faculty and distinguished scholar of early modern literature and Renaissance humanism.
