#### American Eminence: Discourses at the Intersections of Critical Race Theory and Womanist

**Ethics** unpacks and deconstructs the ways in which power resides in the law and theology. Uniquely, American Eminence merges the analytical arsenal of Critical Race Feminist Theory and Womanist Ethics to engage an intersectional analysis of material subjugation. In the past few years, a new generation of progressive intellectuals, known as Critical Race Theorists, have transformed how we understand law, race, and racial power in America. Critical Race Feminists have extended this inquiry to include gender as a central tenet. The combined efforts of Critical Race Theorists and Critical Race Feminists offers a counter narrative to legal discourse. This alternative narrative deconstructs the ways in which the law criminalizes and pathologizes certain demographics, while simultaneously over valorizes others. Critical Race Theorists and Critical Race Feminist for understanding injustice as it occupies the intersectional axes of race, gender, sexuality, and class in ways that seamlessly correlate with Womanist Ethics. Missing from the Critical Race Theorist analytical arsenal or epistemological lexicon, however, are the ways in which theological categories give

divine legitimacy to the denigration of people of color, objectification of women, and the exploitation of the poor. Theological categories are embedded within privileged notions of law and order as well as discipline and punishment. Merging Critical Race Feminism and Womanist Ethics, American Eminence will be the first work to unpack how both law and theology obfuscate the operations of power by creating human subjects that are vulnerable to exploitation and yet willing to participate in it because they believe that the law and divine authority authorize and sanction their denigration.

Throughout American history, sacred rhetoric and the law have held sway in impacting the lives of those within its wake. Drawing from the redemptive strength of this relationship, people of color (as eloquently illustrated by Sojourner Truth and Martin Luther King, Jr., to name a few) in particular have recognized that religious overtones embedded within the rule of law speak more powerfully than the rational pleas for human rights. This spiritual politicization in turn has transformed the way we understand justice. For example, slavery and the subordination of women, which are clearly inhumane, were seen as political matters and largely recognized as based in part, if not totally, on a broad-scale theological appropriation of biblical interpretations that govern the lives of people, which is particularly ironic for a nation that prides itself in the division of church and state. This process of merging social justice into divine order subverts what is purportedly perceived as secular and democratic. This process has also characterized the identity politics of how power operates affording certain people with privilege a divine right, while others are persecuted (as God's will). Towards this end, American identity-based relio-politics has been a source of privilege and persecution and is grafted on the very DNA of America. Thus, religion (at least civil religion) and law (in its practice) are vestiges of bias and domination. Implicit in the marriage of religion and law is not justice as it portends; but rather, its offspring produces intrinsically negative frameworks from which power excludes or marginalizes those that do not fit within its normalizing gaze. The problem with merger is not that one fails to transcend the other, but rather the opposite-that it frequently conflates or ignores the right relationship they should have—religion being the moral conscience of law and law being the moral compass of ethics. American Eminence is a liberatory objective that seeks to empty such categories of any social significance inasmuch as they obfuscate justice for all.

#### **DIVERSITY STATEMENT**

Thirty years ago, in *Race, Reform, and Retrenchment*, Kimberle' Williams Crenshaw noted that the rhetoric of equality -- now sometimes referenced as "diversity and inclusion" -- is ambiguous enough to contain a commitment to material equality as well as retrenchment. My scholarship, pedagogy, and service are committed to a material reality of radical inclusion. My casebooks in both Criminal Law and Criminal Procedure are authored by women committed to race, gender, and class equality. My pedagogy adheres to a commitment to equality in the classroom, the roundedness of the cases and articles inside the text, and transparency in my teaching. "Hide the ball" methods; antiquated and arcane preoccupations devoid of equality concerns, and harsh Socratic Method atmospheres are about the politics of exclusion and completely counter to what I try to achieve in my classes.

By way of scholarship, each of my pieces is a critique of the ways in which the law creates vulnerability for purposes of exploitation. My past, current, and future scholarship is without question devoted to a critique of white heteropatriarchal privilege in all of its devastating forms. My service reflects my scholarly and pedagogical commitments. When I taught at Wayne State University School of Law, in Detroit, Michigan, I served on the Appointments, Clinics, and Damon J. Keith committees. Wayne Law had the honor of hosting the Damon J. Keith Center for Civil Rights. The work of the committee was the material realization of equality in Detroit. During my tenure at Wayne as the head of the Damon J. Keith Center committee, we hosted numerous events, scholars, and workshops with that commitment in mind. Currently, I serve on the hiring committee for the University of Kentucky College of Law. As part of the hiring committee, I am devoted to creating a critical mass of scholars that reflect diversity and inclusion.
