MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

For a one-year membership in the Association, which includes subscription to the MMLA Journal, dues are: \$70 for full professors and administrative personnel; \$65 for associate professors; \$55 for assistant professors and schoolteachers; \$35 for adjunct and part-time faculty; \$30 for students, retired, and unemployed persons; and \$90 for joint members. For a two-year membership, dues are: \$135 for full professors and administrative personnel; \$125 for associate professors; \$105 for assistant professors and schoolteachers; and \$170 for joint members. For a two-year membership, dues are: \$195 for full professors and administrative personnel; \$125 for associate professors; \$105 for assistant professors and schoolteachers; and \$170 for joint members. For a three-year membership, dues are: \$195 for full professors and administrative personnel; \$180 for associate professors; \$150 for assistant professors and schoolteachers; and \$250 for joint members. Sustaining members contribute \$135 per year, supporting members \$85 per year. Departmental memberships are \$200 for one year, \$350 for two years, and \$525 for three years. Membership in the MMLA is for the fiscal year that begins on July 1 of the current year and ends on June 30 of the following year.
