

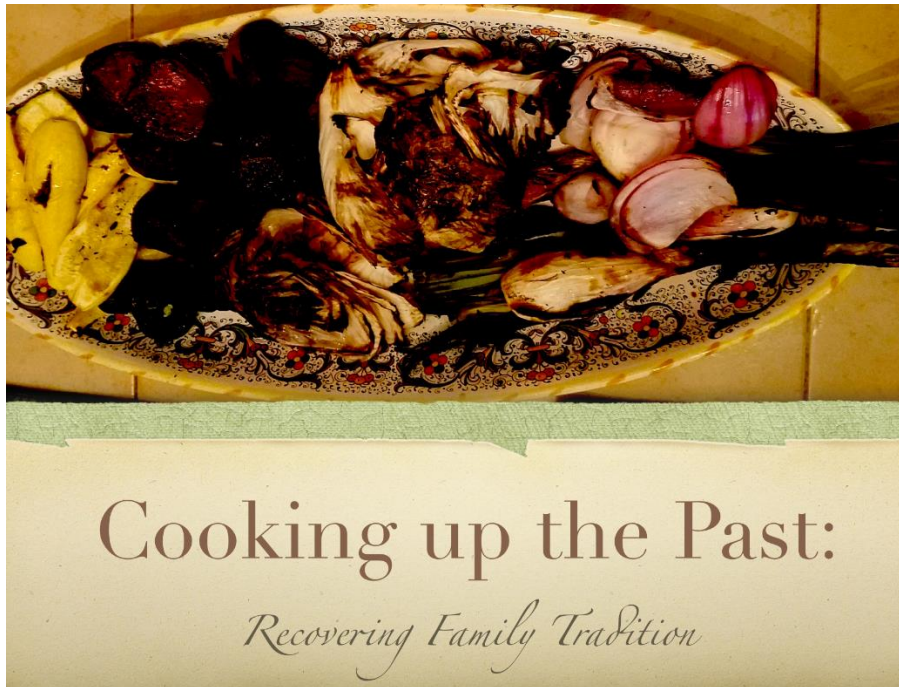

Participants will be asked to bring a notebook and writing utensil and print copies of recipes (and photographs if possible of their families in the kitchen or at the dinner table) to share in small groups as we embark on a culinary tour across cultures and time to reconstruct memory and preserve living history.
