MAJOR OR MINOR IN POLITICAL SCIENCE

Political Science Major. To graduate with a major in Political Science, students must complete 33 hours of course work (11 courses) in the department or through transfer or advanced placement credit. All majors are required to take any three of the following four courses: PLSC 100, 101, 102, and 103 plus one upper-division (200- or 300-level) course from each of the discipline's four subfields: American Politics, Comparative Politics, International Relations and Political Theory.

Please note that this requirement is being introduced for students who declare their majors after June 30, 2021. All students who declared their major prior to July 1 2021, are subject to the previous requirements: they are required to take all three of the following courses: PLSC 100, 101, and 102 plus one upper-division (200- or 300-level) course from each of the discipline's four subfields: American Politics, Comparative Politics, International Relations and Political Theory.

Political Science Minor. To graduate with a minor in Political Science, students must complete 18 hours of course work (6 courses) in the department or through transfer or advanced placement credit. All minors are required to complete any two of the four introductory courses: PLSC 100, PLSC 101, PLSC 102 and PLSC 103. They must also complete four additional courses of their choosing, either introductory or upper-level classes, regardless of the subfield.

Please note that this requirement is being introduced for students who declare their minors after June 30, 2021. All students who declared their minor prior to July 1, 2021, are subject to the previous requirements: they are required to take all three of the following courses: PLSC 100, 101 and 102. The remaining three courses are elective and may be taken in any of the discipline's four subfields: American Politics, Comparative Politics, International Politics and Political Theory.

**Chicago Internship PLSC 370 (Spring, Summer & Fall Semesters) Professor Meghan Condon.**

This program allows students to earn course credit while gaining valuable professional experience as an intern in the Chicago area. Internship possibilities include positions with U.S. Congressmen and Senators, Illinois Legislators, political campaigns, international organizations, policy think-tanks, and city, state, and federal government agencies.
