MAJOR OR MINOR IN POLITICAL SCIENCE

Political Science Major. To graduate with a major in Political Science students must complete 33 hours of course work (11 courses) in the department or through transfer or advanced placement credit. All majors are required to take PLSC 100, 101 and 102, plus one upper-division (200- or 300-level) course from each of the discipline's four subfields: American Politics, Comparative Politics, International Relations, and Political Theory. The remaining four courses are elective and may be taken in any of the discipline's four subfields. Students must earn a grade of C- or better in a course for it to count toward the major.

Political Science Minor. To graduate with a minor in Political Science students must complete 18 hours of course work (6 courses) in the department or through transfer or advanced placement credit. All minors are required to take PLSC 100, 101 and 102. The remaining three courses are elective and may be taken in any of the discipline's four subfields: American Politics, Comparative Politics, International Relations, and Political Theory. Students must earn a grade of C- or better in a course for it to count toward the minor.

Loyola Semester in Washington, DC Program (Fall & Spring Semesters). Do you wish to spend an entire semester living, studying, and interning in Washington, DC? If your answer is "yes," we are accepting applications for the Loyola Semester in Washington, DC Program, which is a joint collaboration between the Department of Political Science in the College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Communication, and the Office of Government Affairs in the Office of the President. This new program, enables the motivated student to (1) gain valuable professional experience and earn course credit while serving four days a week as a student intern in a host office in Washington, DC; (2) enroll as a full-time student in classes taught by Loyola faculty; and (3) experience life for an entire semester in the unique setting that is our nation's capital: Washington, DC. Political Science Honors Seminar PLSC 395 (Spring Semester). Do you wish to graduate with "honors" in Political Science? If your answer is "yes," you should apply for enrollment in the Political Science Honors Seminar which is offered each spring and open to students in their junior or senior years. Admission into the Honors Seminar requires a 3.5 GPA in Political Science (and overall) as well as the completion of seven Political Science classes (21 credit hours). Chicago Internship PLSC 370 (Spring, Summer & Fall Semesters) Professor Alexandru Grigorescu. This program allows students to earn course credit while gaining valuable professional experience as an intern in the Chicago area. Internship possibilities include positions with U.S. Congressmen and Senators, Illinois Legislators, political campaigns, international organizations, policy think-tanks, and city, state, and federal government agencies. Interns earn 3 or 6 credit hours by working in an internship position that is jointly agreed upon by the student and the internship coordinator. The intern also takes part in a special seminar that meets four times during the semester and keeps a journal and writes a research paper related to the internship experience.
