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Political Science Major

To graduate with a major in Political Science, students must complete 33 hours of course work (11 courses) in the department or through transfer or advanced placement credit. All majors are required to take any three of the following four courses: PLSC 100, 101, 102, and 103, plus one upper-division (200- or 300-level) course from each of the discipline's four subfields: American Politics, Comparative Politics, International Relations and Political Theory.

Political Science Minor

To graduate with a minor in Political Science, students must complete 18 hours of course work (6 courses) in the department or through transfer or advanced placement credit. All minors are required to complete any two of the four introductory courses: PLSC 100, PLSC 101, PLSC 102 and PLSC 103. They must also complete four additional courses of their choosing, either introductory or upper-level classes, regardless of the subfield.

Honors in Political Science

Qualified majors may earn Honors in Political Science by completing a twelfth course: the Political Science Honors Seminar (PLSC 395). The seminar explores a different research topic in Political Science each year. Admission into the program requires a 3.5 GPA overall and in Political Science, as well as the completion of seven Political Science classes (21 credit hours). The Honors Seminar does not count toward the 33 credit hours required for a Political Science major. Chicago Internship Program

This program allows students to earn course credit while gaining valuable professional experience as an intern in the Chicagoland area. Internship opportunities include positions with U.S. Representatives and Senators, Illinois Legislators, political campaigns, international organizations, policy think-tanks, and city, state, and federal agencies. Interns earn 3 or 6 credit hours by working in an internship position that is jointly agreed upon by the student and the internship coordinator. The intern also takes part in a special seminar that meets four times during the semester and keeps a journal and writes a research paper related to the internship experience. Students need the permission of the internship coordinator to register and must submit an application form.
