Biographical History

Born September 24, 1914, Frances Marjorie Mikkelson showed musical talent even as a young girl. Later, as a student of Mundelein College, Frances continued her education in music including choral and composition, where she met her future husband, Alexander Harley. After graduating in 1936 from Mundelein, Frances and Alexander wed but Frances continued to study music including choral arrangement with Walter Aschenbrenner, and composition and orchestration with Leo Sowery at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago where she earned her Master of Music Degree. With the help of Aschenbrenner, Frances published 45 of Frances' choral compositions through Carl Fischer Music Publications.

Frances also directed a large number of choral groups including the St. Lukes Lutheran Adult Choir, the Park Ridge Men's Choir, and the Illinois Men's Chorus, in addition to privately teaching music in her home—a practice that continued over 35 years and totaled well over two thousand students. Despite continual involvement in her community as a teacher and volunteer, and in addition to her many public performances, Frances was also a co-founder of the TRI-M Music Honor Society (originally titled TRI-M Maine Music Masters) with her husband, Alexander, in 1936, at the Maine Township High School in Park Ridge, Illinois. The society today is an internationally recognized organization that honors outstanding youth academic and musical achievement. The Hurley's governed the TRI-M's from their home until it was absorbed into the National Association for Music Education (MENC) in 1983, although they both continued to serve as consultants for the organization and write for the TRI-M Newsletter through the 1990s.

Scope and Content

This collection consists of 1 box, spanning the years 1931 to 1996, and being predominantly from 1960 to 1990. The collection is divisible into three sections: personal, academic, and professional. The personal records include biographical information about Frances and her husband Alexander, as

well as programs announcing some of her public appearances, music compositions, and photograph (print copy). The academic records consist solely of photocopies of papers written by Frances during her time at Mundelein, the American Conservatory of Music, at the University of Southern California. The professional records include all information related to the TRI-M Society, including newsletters, histories, and honorary members list. These papers are divided into three series, arranged alphabetically by subject and original order was maintained whenever possible.

Series 1: Biographical, 1931-1996, n.d., Box 1

Contains information related to her personal development, especially as a musician, but also an outline of her biography written by unknown persons. Information relating to her husband, Alexander Harley is also present, including the lengthy memorial and tribute composed by Frances at his death.

Series 2: Academic, 1985-1987, n.d., Box 1

Contains photocopies of papers written by Frances Mikkelson while a student at Mundelein College, all related to music, music theory, famous composers, or history of music except two which deal with military training and World War I.

Series 3: Professional, 1962-1995, n.d., Box 1

Contains all information related to TRI-M Honor Society, including histories, newsletters, and some print (copy) images.
